"The Food Bank helps us so much during the holidays"

Hundreds of families and seniors visit the Food Bank's Client Choice Food Pantry to receive food assistance every week. The food pantry is set up like a small grocery store, and Food Bank clients can visit by appointment to self-select the foods that best meet their household's dietary needs.

The food pantry offers a variety of fresh fruits, fresh vegetables, meats, dairy products, breads, nonperishable canned foods along with other resources such as diapers for infants and toddlers and period supplies.

Maria and her daughter Talia (pictured above left) visited the food pantry which is open daily throughout the week for those facing food insecurity to receive food assistance from the Food Bank. "There are five of us in our family. My daughter Talia is four months old. My daughter Daniela is six years old and in the first grade, and my daughter Diana is thirteen years old and in the eighth grade. My husband works as a car mechanic in Vista. Before I had Talia, I worked cleaning houses, but I am staying home to look after my new baby, and we are now struggling to survive on one paycheck," says Maria.

"Getting by on one paycheck is hard. We are finding it more difficult to afford rent, gas and food. Food costs have gone up so much, and we have much more expenses now with our baby. One of the biggest things that helps is the diapers and period supplies that we get from the Food Bank because they are so expensive to buy at the store. The money we save from that helps us to pay for rent and gas."

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We Need Your Support This Holiday Season



As the holiday season approaches, we extend our deepest gratitude for your dedicated support this year. Thanks to you, our neighbors in need continue to have access to nutritious food year-round.

Unfortunately, this has been another challenging year for our service population.

A study by San Diego State University, commissioned by the Food Bank, confirmed a poignant reality: a staggering 76% of households sought our services primarily due to escalating living costs, while 45%

shared that they simply do not earn enough to make ends meet due to our region's high cost of living. Many are seeking food assistance for the very first time!

Currently, the Food Bank is feeding an average of 400,000 people per month in communities throughout San Diego County. To meet this demand, we have set a goal to increase the amount of food distributed this year to 48 million pounds which is an increase of 3 million pounds of food from last year. Your generosity makes this possible.

As we enter this festive season, the Food Bank will experience more demand for our services, and we need your help. Below are ways you can help the Food Bank feed San Diegans facing food insecurity during our Holiday Food Drive:

- Organize a food drive at your school, workplace, civic group or religious organization.
- Donate securely online via the Food Bank's website. Every \$1 donated provides 2 meals to San Diegans facing food insecurity.
- Volunteer at the Food Bank's warehouses in Miramar or Vista by registering online.

This year, our Holiday Food Drive partners are making it even easier to donate. Visit any San Diego County Albertsons or Vons supermarket from now until Jan. 2 and donate at checkout, or donate nonperishable food items in our red food drive barrels at the front of the store. 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"Last year, our rent went up \$300, and it has made it much harder to get by. I plan to return to work when the children are older, but right now we are relying on one paycheck for the family. Today I went to get gas, and it was the most expensive that it's ever been," explains Maria.

"The food, diapers and period supplies that we receive from the Food Bank are helping so much because they are making it possible for us to afford other expenses every

"The fresh produce we get from the Food Bank helps so much. We couldn't afford to buy it at the grocery store because it's so expensive," continues Maria.

"Also, the Food Bank helps us so much during the holidays. The food we received last year made it possible for us to have a nice holiday meal with my family." Charlotte (pictured top right on page 1) also visited the Food Bank to receive food assistance for her and her husband who are struggling to get by on a fixed income.


"My friends told me that I could get help from the Food Bank. I am 78 years old, and my husband George is 81 years old. We are retired and living on a fixed income now. We are both on Social Security, but it's getting harder and harder to get by," explains Charlotte.

"We retired a long time ago. Things were ok when we retired, but in the last eight years or so, things have gotten really tough. We just can't make ends meet like we used to before when we first retired. The Food Bank helps us so much. The fresh produce is amazing. We can't afford to buy produce at the store. I have congestive heart failure so there are a lot of things that I can't eat, but all of the fresh produce we get from the Food Bank helps so much. If it wasn't for the Food Bank, we wouldn't be able to eat fresh fruits and vegetables. The fresh produce is amazing," she continues.

"I visit the Food Bank when we need food. The Food Bank has helped us so much over the holidays. Last year, we got a turkey and groceries. There's no way we could have afforded a turkey, but thanks to the Food Bank we had a nice holiday because of the turkey and the groceries. I just want to say thank you to the Food Bank's donors for helping us and making this possible."
